Subject: Clarification on Domestic Manufacturing Claims:

MacLean receives many requests for certification to Buy America, Buy American, and Made in America. These terms may sound similar, but the actual definitions are very different.

## BUY AMERICA CERTIFIED \* CERTIFIED

## **Buy America**

- Applies to Iron and Steel, only
  - Not applicable to other materials
- 100% of content must by of US origin <u>from melt</u>
- Detailed documentation required
- Often associated with federally funded projects --- Federal Transit Admin (FTA), Federal Highway Admin (FHWA), and Federal Aviation Admin (FAA)

## **Buy American**

 Must be manufactured in the US, and the cost of components mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States exceeds 50% of the cost of all its components

## Made in America or Made in the USA

- This is a generic term that is more commonly associated with how a product is advertised. Often, we see qualifying statement associated with these claims.
  - o Unqualified claim --- needs to be "all or virtually all" made in the US
    - Note that this claim does not necessarily mean Buy America compliant
  - Qualified claim --- Made from US and foreign content with a qualifying statement.
    - Examples
      - "60% US content"
      - "Made in USA and of domestic and imported parts"
      - "Assembled in the USA"

The position of MacLean is to support <u>only the **Buy America** claims</u>, which is also the most commonly requested and the most stringent definition of domestic content and origin. All other domestic claims are subject to some level of interpretation.
